During this time, the curriculum at Eccleston Mere has been well and truly enriched. Y6 pupils have visited the Liverpool World Museum; Y4 pupils visited the Ganesh Hindu Temple in Liverpool, whilst Year 1 to 6 took part in the recent Quidditch day, which was a lot of fun!

We also take pride in our pupils for the way that they have conducted themselves throughout the term. Liverpool Ganesh Temple

During the visit, children learned about different Hindu Avatars, by observing and sketching different sculptures and shrines. We were fortunate to visit during the festival of Navratri, which celebrates the Goddess Durga, and her many forms.

Year 6 children visited the Liverpool World Museum, where they saw Ancient Egyptian mummies and were able to view the many artefacts on show in the renovated Egyptology section. In addition to this, pupils took part in a workshop, learning all about the Rosetta Stone and it's significance.
